On Saturday, January 11, Union County hosted the 2020 South Central District's annual Winter Enrichment. Winter Enrichment is an opportunity for youth between the ages of 13 and 18 to learn about leadership and 4-H beyond the county level. The day began with a business meeting conducted by the youth officers, followed by a variety of interactive workshops, lunch, a service project, and finally a trip to the Big Air trampoline park in Mathews, N.C. After the business meeting, more than 100 youth scrambled to register for the workshops of their choice. The workshops included workshops on team building, theatre and improv, the Ambassador Program, and an escape room.

The purpose of Achievement Night is to honor and recognize Anson County 4-H'ers, 4-H Volunteer Leaders for their accomplishments from the previous year, and Volunteer Leaders who have given their time and efforts to assist with 4-H programs. Youth and adults were recognized and received certificates and ribbons for their accomplishments. 4-H alumni, Commissioner Lawrence Gatewood, was present to give the greetings.

Several, well deserving 4-H'ers earned scholarships for the effort and hard work they put into their club project work. These scholarships are funded through program fundraising efforts and will be used toward 4-H trips, camps, and 4-H project area supplies.

Anson County 4-H's Response to the COVID-19 Pandemic

Anson County 4-H must adhere to the executive orders and instructions of the federal, state, and local government in response to COVID 19 pandemic. Additionally, Cooperative Extension, which covers 4-H Youth Development, has specific instructions in which Anson County 4-H must comply. As a result, the Cooperative Extension Office has stopped face-to-face services and Anson County 4-H has cancelled programming until April 3 per Anson County Government. We have been further instructed to cancel all in-person 4-H activities scheduled for the next 60 days unless they can be done online. This is effective immediately until May 22. Due to the face-to-face nature of the following upcoming activities, programs will be canceled or postponed unless they can be done online:

- **4-H Outing to Charlotte Hornets:** Originally scheduled for Sunday April 5 has been canceled. The NBA season has been suspended indefinitely.
- **Fashion Revue and Talent Show:** Originally set for April 30 with rehearsals on April 29, has all but been canceled. There is a possibility the event can be conducted virtually. More information will be given at a later date.
- **County Presentation Night:** Originally set for April 30, has all but been canceled. There is a possibility the event can be conducted virtually. More information will be given at a later date.
- **Spring Paper Clover Event:** Set for April 29 through May 10, Anson County 4-H will likely refrain from directly participating in this event as a group. Supporters of Anson County 4-H can still visit the local Tractor Supply between April 29 and May 10 and purchase paper clovers.
- Environmental Field Day 2nd Graders: Event has been cancelled.
- Refuge Adventures 3rd Graders: Event has been cancelled.

Summer Programs: Anson County 4-H is offering a Summer Day Camp June 9-11; July 7-9; July 14-16 and Aug. 3-7. These are tentative dates. The day camps will be for youth ages 5-12. Camps will be specified by age. There is a limit of 25 and the cost is \$40. Youth can use their scholarship to attend. Flyers and brochures will go out soon with more details.

NC 4-H Citizenship Focus: NC 4-H'ers are in Raleigh for 3 days learning about youth voice and citizenship in action. One of the highlights of this conference is going to the NC General Assembly to meet with their elected officials. This event will take place June 15-17. As I receive more details I will send out.

NC 4-H Electric Congress: Is an informal hands-on youth program where youth learn about the fundamentals of electricity, renewable energy technologies, and energy conservation. This event will be on July 7-9. Forms will go out as soon as I receive them.

District Activity Day: Is an opportunity for youth to showcase their presentation skills in front of a group of judges. Youth who win gold or silver medal at District Activity Day will advance to compete at the state level at NC State University. Richmond County is hosting this year and the date will be Saturday, June 20. I will send out more information as I get more details.

NC 4-H Congress Is an educational opportunity for youth to learn about current issues through educational experiences with speakers, discussion groups, and workshops. Youth are also provided the opportunity to develop and exercise leadership skills, and enjoy recreational and social experiences with other 4-H youth. NC 4-H Congress will be July 18-21 in Raleigh, NC. As I receive more details I will send out.
